Lastly, we explored the challenges and opportunities in genre evolution, including meeting audience expectations, genre saturation, and the potential for cross-pollination and hybrid genres. Filmmakers have the chance to adapt to changing societal dynamics, embrace technological advancements, and explore new storytelling possibilities to keep genres fresh and engaging.

The film industry will continue to evolve, influenced by audience preferences, technological advancements, and societal changes. Filmmakers in Hollywood and Bollywood will undoubtedly continue to push boundaries, experiment with genres, and captivate audiences with their unique storytelling approaches.

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
