Origin and Motivation Behind *Man in Black*

A very in-depth analysis of the origins and motivations for the song *Man in Black* is provided by Alan Light in his book *Johnny Cash: The Life and Legacy of the Man in Black* (Light, 2018a, p. 176). Light also notes that Cash chose to use music as a vehicle for social commentary, putting his views into the music and subliminally influencing the public as he sings, for example, the lyrics of the song 'I wear the black for the poor and the beaten down, Livin' in the hopeless, hungry side of town' demonstrates Cash's sensitivity to injustice and oppression in society. He uses the song to call attention to those who are marginalized and neglected in society (Light, 2018a, p. 105).

Elaine Willett reveals the reception of the song and its lasting impact in *Johnny Cash: The Man in Black* (Willett, 2010, p. 55).
